For those that don't knit or crochet you could use a variety of things, such as an old sock, an old pair of leggings, the sleeve of an old sweatshirt, or if your Chihuahua is on the bigger side use a sweatpant leg to make the sweater. Cut to the proper length, use the cuff as the part that goes around the neck and cut holes in appropriate places for the legs.

Do You Want To Show Your Dog? By Diane Kimura Sugiyama

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Are dog shows for me? What should I expect? What do I win or what happens if I lose? These are some of the real questions that need to be addressed by everyone who is contemplating whether or not to succumb to this sometimes additive sport. Yes, dog shows are a sport. It is where a AKC licensed judge gives his subjective opinion of your dog based on his/her interpretation of the standard of the breed. Only one dog from each breed can win each day to compete in the group. That winner for the day is called the BEST

OF BREED. No one likes to lose. But, if you can't really accept defeat, then dog shows are not for you. The true sportsman sometimes wins and loses and accepts this as a game only. Not everyone can win. Only one male and one female will win points for a day in every breed if there are enough dogs entered to make points.

To find out if dog shows are something you want to do, try entering a fun match ('B'Match, no points awarded) first to see what it is like. There, you will get first hand knowledge of a mini dog show. First of all, read the AKC standard for our breed and decide if your dog meets the standard. You may also decide to get another's opinion on this, since it can be difficult to decide. Check to see if your dog has any disqualifying faults (listed in the standard), and if your dog does, then entering a show with him may mean great disapointment. Next, watch the announcements for handling classes where you will learn how to present your dog in the ring. There are several classes offered by different organizations around town. Then you are ready to go to a 'B' fun match, and see if you would enjoy showing your dog in competition for real points at a regular dog show.

As in any sport, there are good and poor losers. Expect to see both. The excellent part of participation in dog shows is meeting different people who have the same love of dogs as we all do. I find it exciting to meet a lot of different people with different breeds of dogs. You also learn about other breeds and see them if you have not seen them before. Remember, winning is not everything. If you lose today to this judge, the next judge may like your dog. You just never know. If you do win, you will get a ribbon. If you are lucky enough, you might win Winners Bitch or Winners Dog, which may give you points toward your dog's AKC championship. Of course winning Best of Breed sends you on to further competition in the Toy Group, and the winner of the Toy Group goes on to competition for Best in Show.

Just remember, that even if your dog loses, there is always another day. He or she is always FIRST PLACE in your heart.

TASTY TREATS

Cheese Treats

in cool place.

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 4 cups (1 lb.) Shredded Sharp Cheddar cheese
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon sesame seeds, parmesan cheese or garlic powder

All ingredients should be at room temperature. Cream butter with mixer or food processor using steel blade. Blend in cheese, and flour. Chill about 1 hr. Shape into 1-inch balls. Put sesame seed, Parmesan Cheese or Garlic powder on small plates. Dip the tops of the balls into the chosen topping. Place on ungreased baking sheets to bake. Keep the balls not cooking in the refrigerator. Bake at 400 degrees F about 10min. Do not brown. The balls will not be dry when done. Cool on baking sheets. Store in airtight containers

UPDATES/NOTICES

Quarantine Fees--The State Department of Agriculture (DOA) is proposing to change the fees for Animal Quarantine. Our club provided testimony against the large increase, and for the State to look for alternatives. On Ap. 29th, the DOA, at a meeting for the Board of Agriculture, plans to recommend the rate increases, with some revisions. The fees for the 30-day quarantine will be gradually implemented over a 4 yr. period. They had originally proposed a \$350 fee, now they are changing this fee to \$150 for the first 45 days (after the fee is implemented), then from 46 days to 2 years, the cost will be \$250. From 2 to 4 yrs. it changes to \$270. From 4 years after the start date, the fee will be \$290. The Board meeting is on April 29th at 9:30 am. We will keep you informed.

American Kennel Club—We have informed the AKC about the formal organization of our club. They have responded by opening up a file for us. We will keep them up to date on our club's progress.

Chihuahua Club of America—We have also informed our 'parent club' of our organization, and will also keep them updated on our club's progress.

BOOK REVIEW By Teresa Lee

Impossible. Difficult. Incorrigible. Does this sound like your dog when it comes to training him? Do you get frustrated when your dog doesn't want to do what you're trying to teach him and wonder to yourself 'why train him at all?'

Training your dog is important to its overall well being. Not only does it shape him into a desirable companion, but training also makes for a stronger relationship between dog and owner. But what is one to do when training becomes a real challenge for the owner of a difficult dog or independent breed?

Betty Fisher and Suzanne Delzio's book, <u>So Your Dog's Not Lassie: Tips for Training Difficult Dogs and Independent Breeds</u>, will teach you how to work with your dog by employing or overcoming the traits that make your dog difficult to train.

Fisher and Delzio will show you how to use body language, rewards (food and verbal/ physical), training structure and style to get your dog to do what you ask. They start off by providing brief descriptions of traits of hard-to-train dogs and how to correct them. They move on to inform you what you need to know and have before you can even start to train your dog. Throughout the book photos are provided in addition to description or instructions to give you a semblance of what they're talking about.

The authors provide tips that can help with the training process and warnings that may hinder progress. And should progress be slow or not what you expected, Fisher and Delzio don't advocate correction by hitting or yelling. They believe in using your intelligence to correct, by asserting your dominance using your voice, and praising when appropriate.

By following their guidelines, you'll soon get your dog performing basic commands such as sit, stay, and come, and he'll be on his way to being a perfect companion or even a successful show dog. You can pick this book up from our public library.
