SOFT DOGGIE COOKIES

Nonstick cooking spray or shortening
3 jars (2 1/2 ounces each) beef or chicken baby food
1/2 cup nonfat dry milk powder
1/2 cup wheat germ or cream of wheat
Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Spray a baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray or grease with shortening.
In a mixing bowl, combine all of the remaining ingredients until thoroughly mixed. Drop by teaspoonfuls on the prepared baking sheet. Bake for 15 minutes or until brown. Remove from the oven and cool on a wire rack. Store in the refrigerator to keep fresh or freeze.
Makes about 2 dozen.

FIREWORKS

In 1994, the State Legislature passed the "Fireworks Control Law" which removed the regulation of fireworks from the counties to the

jurisdiction of the State. This law can be found in chapter 132D of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. It governs when fireworks can be used, what are the prohibited activities, licenses for the sale of fireworks, and permits for its use. It also prohibits the use of aerial fireworks without a permit.

Because of the excessive noise, smoke and the proliferation of illegal aerals during the recent holidays, fireworks legislation promises to be a "hot" topic in this year's legislative session. The City Council has also approved Resolution 00-06 urging the Legislature to amend and strengthen the fireworks control law.

There may be dozens of fireworks bills to follow during this year's session and tracking the bills can be a time consuming and complicated task. Besides the newspapers and television news, legislation can be tracked using the Legislature 's website at



<http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov>. This site includes bill status, the directory of your legislators, the

legislative timetable and other helpful information about the legislative process.

As animal lovers and caring pet owners, the Chihuahua Club of Hawaii would like to have its members support "responsible fireworks legislation". Whether you believe in a total fireworks ban or stiffer penalties for the illegal use of fireworks or more funding for law enforcement or have any other good ideas, please contact your area legislators and let them know what you think. There will be public hearings for written or oral testimonies, however a simple phone call, fax or e-mail will do. Voicing your opinion will help your legislators make more informed decisions.

In the meantime, the Hawaiian Humane Society suggests helping our pets cope with fireworks by keeping them in a quiet, interior room and having your presence there to comfort and reassure them.
